Administration

Gary Giver and members of the Loveland Shorts Film Festival team attended this week's City Council meeting to promote the upcoming festival. In recognition of the event's growing impact on the arts in our community, Mayor Bailey presented a proclamation officially declaring August 1–3 as Loveland Shorts Film Festival Weekend in the City of Loveland.



Building and Zoning

- Framing work is in progress on the new band storage building at Loveland High School and footer work has begun for the athletic storage building. Plans were submitted for a new band tower at the high school as well.
- AT&T submitted plans to upgrade their antenna on the cell tower at 322 E. Kemper Road.
- Wendy's, 10601 Loveland Madeira Road, has submitted plans for interior and exterior alterations.
- Slab work is underway for a new home at 142 Lakeview Court.

Public Works

Public Works staff completed repairs on three water service lines this week, located on Quailwoods Drive, Sleepy Ridge Drive, and Oak Canyon Drive. These efforts are part of our continued commitment to maintaining dependable water service and proactively addressing infrastructure needs across the city.

The Cherokee Water Main Project is nearing completion, with the contractor currently performing final milling in preparation for paving next week. This milestone marks the end of a major infrastructure improvement effort in the Cherokee Drive and Main Street area.



Throughout the project, crews installed a new 8-inch water main along Main Street to eliminate a long-standing dead-end line and replaced the aging water main on Cherokee Drive. Water services and meter pits were also upgraded across the project area to improve overall system reliability.

Significant stormwater infrastructure upgrades were completed as part of the project, including new storm sewer lines, catch basins, and the replacement of an undersized storm pipe on Main Street to enhance drainage and reduce the risk of future flooding.

The project also featured a variety of roadway improvements. These included full-depth pavement repairs, resurfacing of affected streets, concrete curb and ADA curb ramp upgrades, and the installation of new signposts.

Once paving is complete, the Cherokee Water Main Project will officially conclude, bringing long-term benefits to the community's infrastructure and roadway systems.

Public Safety

At Tuesday's City Council Meeting, LSFDF Executive Officer Bruce Hawk gave a presentation on creating a Community Paramedicine Program. The program would create direct care from a trained paramedic to:

- Frequent EMS users
- Patients needing non-emergency assistance
- Lifting assistance
- Support with medication compliance
- Managing minor health issues
- Reduce reliance on ambulances for non-critical needs.

Upcoming Meetings & Events

The final Concert in the Park for the summer is happening this Saturday, July 12, at 6 p.m. in the Nisbet Park Amphitheater. Black Top Rodeo is traveling in from Lexington, Kentucky, to bring us an evening of great country music.

A temporary eastbound lane closure will be in place on W. Loveland Avenue between Engle and Elm Streets on July 14 and 15, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., to allow for water main improvement work.
